1. Think about your Exercise 1 conversation where you asked the LLM a question, got its reply, then asked "are you sure?". Write the document that was fed to the model to generate the first word of its reply to the follow-up question. (You don't need to mark the boundaries between tokens.)

2. Now imagine a conversation where you provide the model an *image* (say, of a whiteboard) and ask it "what's on the board" and to make it look like a chalkboard instead. **Sketch what the document might look like** for the input and reply.

- 3. Two discussion questions:
 - a. Someone once argued (on a video call I was on) that ChatGPT is reliable on questions about Scripture interpretation because it has been trained on the Bible and so many people's writings about it. Is this a good argument? Why or why not?

b. Suppose a teacher suspects that an essay was written by ChatGPT. So they copy-paste the essay into ChatGPT and ask "did you write this?". Good idea or not? Discuss.

Before you leave, pick a couple of these questions to react to:

- 1. What was the most important concept from today for you?
- 2. What was the muddiest concept today?
- 3. How does what we did today connect with what you've learned before?
- 4. What would you like to review or clarify next time we meet?
- 5. What are you curious, hopeful, or excited about?
